Bristol's twin city relationships began with new relationships with Hannover and Bordeaux in 1947 and Bristol Archives holds various sources related to these and other associations. Selected collections and papers are described here, although this list is not comprehensive.

Bordeaux, France (1947)

Maritime connections between Bristol and Bordeaux have existed since Roman times and the wine trade between the two cities dates back to the twelfth century. Bristol's Great Red Book bears testimony to trade between the cities in the late middle ages, with Bristol the main port (after London) for imports of Bordeaux wine.

The modern twinning began through a connection between Bristol University and Bordeaux University. In February 1947, a committee was formed to foster links between the cities. This became the Bristol Bordeaux Association in 1953 when a constitution was drawn up.

From the outset, school exchanges were central to the association's activities. The first exchange involved pupils and staff from Bristol's Fairfield Grammar School in September 1947. Over the first 25 years, this developed into exchanges of up to 1,000 students

Other exchange activities have included an annual boat race between Bristol University and Bordeaux's naval school) (1950s to 1960s), as well as football, tennis, hockey and rugby matches. Further exchanges have related to the arts, Bordeaux's grape harvest, an annual Bristol Bordeaux Ball (1948 to 1963) and regular civic visits.

Hannover, Germany (1947)

In August 1947, five 'men of goodwill' from Bristol visited Hannover to explore a potential relationship between the two cities, which both suffered serious damage during the Second World War.

The men were Alderman St John Reade (Vice-Chairman of Bristol's Education Committee), Professor Dr August Closs (Professor of German, Bristol University), Edward G Seath (secretary of the city's Youth Committee), Croften E Gane (businessman) and Donald Hughes (artist).



This was the first post-war twinning between British and German cities. Their message of peace laid the foundation for over 500 more twinnings between British and German communities.

After the visit, Bristol's city council set up a working committee to plan further contact with Hannover. The first meeting of the Bristol-Hannover Council was held in April 1948. Around that time, Bristol sent 'relief goods' to post-war Hannover, such as shoes, clothes and food.

Bristol's first official visit to Hannover took place in 1950, with a Hannover visit to Bristol in 1952. There have been many school exchanges over the years. In 1977, the first sporting exchange to Hannover marked the 30th anniversary of the twinning. In 1983, the city of Hannover was awarded the Freedom of the City of Bristol.
